Curriculum and Assessment

Summary of changes to the school prospectus since publication.

The break and lunches are to be switched for September 2023. This means that Years 9,10 and 11 will now have break first at 10:40am and lunch first at 12:20pm. Year 7 and Year 8 will follow at 11:00am and 1:20pm respectively. This is to support the need of GCSE students to eat lunch before any afternoon exam in the year.

Action taken to develop or strengthen links with the community.

As the 21st century build comes to an end, Whitmore is now able to use the building to increase community links by allowing access to the excellent facilities. A range of local sports teams including: Barry Island Marine, Cadoxton Imps, Rhoose AFC, Dinas Powys RFC, Barry Athletic and Town, Holton Road FC, Red Dragon Netball and Sully FC access the sporting facilities All age groups from the community are involved, with both children and adults having the opportunity to access the facilities. Whitmore is currently action planning an adult basic Welsh course to be piloted in 2023 encouraging local people to improve their Welsh language skills. Through our activities enrichment program, Whitmore has made excellent links with local clubs including Bryn Hill Golf Club who run an academy for selected pupils from Whitmore and True Aim Archery Club who run out of Llantwit Major. A transition program for feeder schools has allowed primaries to visit the school, on a consistent basis, to maintain strong links and encourage a seamless transition to high school. Feeders have also been invited up for important testing. Pupils are given the opportunity to work in the environment that will be the norm for the next 5 to 7 years. Since Covid Whitmore has continued to open its doors to numerous musical and dramatic productions. These are open to the whole community and are consistently well attended.

In Year 12 skills week, several business leaders from the Barry Community are invited in to support Sixth Formers with their interview skills. These are excellent community links, with opportunities for 'in house' graduate courses and links to work experience.

The table above is the attendance summary report sent to Welsh government in June 2023. Though the final attendance percentage is 87.2%, there has been a significant 1% improvement since Christmas. This has been achieved through parental engagement with the issue and a range of monitoring strategies that have been used to ascertain the best way forward in increasing overall attendance back to pre Covid levels. Clearly there is more work to do, but the school is working closely with the local authority to identify poor attenders and making sure the most effective approach is taken with each individual case.

Progress on meeting sporting aims, and sporting achievements.

Physical Education

Physical Education Lessons

Pupils have enjoyed another successful year in physical education in and outside of lesson time. Pupils have benefitted from a balanced curriculum offering opportunities for participation and excellence which allow growth of knowledge and understanding of sport, activities and healthy lifestyle.

In September the physical education department introduced a new participation policy which encouraged pupils to positively engage with sport and activity by removing barriers to participation. A kit store was stocked with school physical education kit and footwear to allow pupils to borrow clean, suitable kit whenever they needed it for lessons. The result has been that participation rates in the subject have never been higher, and with the support of parents and guardians we are aiming to build on this positive engagement next year. The curriculum has included a variety of new sports and activities to provide a breadth and depth of curriculum in which pupils engage positively. As well as our traditional team and individual sports and activities, we have introduced new experiences including tennis, dance, volleyball and table tennis and a focus on fundamental movement skills and these additions have had a positive impact on pupils' progress.

There have also been successes in extra-curricular physical education sports and activities this year.

Football

As always, every year group enjoyed competing in the Cardiff and Vale Schools football league and cup competitions. Year 7 boys and Year 9 boys won their respective leagues and the amount of matches played throughout the season allowed pupils the opportunity to test themselves against the best schools in the region. The girls' teams are still in their infancy stage, but opportunities are regularly provided to train and play matches, whilst Year 7 and 8 both competed in the Cardiff City Premier League Inspires Tournament.

A number of boys and girls were also successful in representing the Cardiff and Vale Schools representative teams and we have more being successful at the recent trials and joining the squads for the 2023/24 season.

Staff from different departments have coached and officiated throughout the season and the amount of football opportunities on offer could only happen with their support and is hugely appreciated.

Rugby Union

Numerous fixtures have been played by year groups 7 to 11 with a sizeable number of pupils playing competitive rugby for the first time. Fixtures have been played against schools in the Vale of Glamorgan as well as a range of other Cardiff schools with pupils also receiving training with staff after school when not playing fixtures.

Whitmore High also competed in the prestigious Rosslyn Park National Schools 7s competition in March. Teams at U13 and U14 level competed admirably against schools from all over the UK in what is still the largest schools 7s competition in the UK.

Pupils from Year 9 and 10 were successful in being selected for the Vale of Glamorgan U15 squad. Will Payne captained the team and George Strong was picked a year young which was a fantastic achievement and he was also selected to represent the Vale of Glamorgan in the U15 7's squad.

<u>Netball</u>

A positive year in Netball for all four school teams and pupils attended weekly training sessions from September to May together to improve their skills and develop as a team. With over thirteen fixtures played against other schools and participating in the Vale tournament at the end of the season, the girls were delighted with their performances and how much they had progressed. The department has now formed a strong partnership with Red Dragon Netball club from Barry, with external coaches supporting each weekly training session every Thursday and Sunday.

Gymnastics

The introduction of a weekly Gymnastics training club has sparked a frenzy for competition amongst the pupils. With all four major school competitions entered this year for the first time, the pupils had the opportunity the compete against schools from across South Wales. 56 pupils entered across all four competitions with 16 pupils reaching the Welsh Novice tumble and Vault final and Welsh Tumble and floor finals. We are currently looking for sponsorship to buy the pupils a team gymnastics kit for next year and planning a fund raiser to purchase an inflatable air track in the memory of Bill Jones.

<u>Dance</u>

Dance has been introduced onto the PE curriculum with each year group receiving a block of Dance lessons. An extra-curricular dance club was established in September with a strong squad of 26 pupils who, showcased their first performance piece at St. David's Hall, Cardiff at the Rubicon School's Dance festival. A fantastic opportunity that was thoroughly enjoyed by pupils, parents and staff.

During the second term, Rubicon Dance were invited into school to work with a variety of PE and Drama lessons. The pupils had the opportunity to work alongside 2 professional dancers learning GCSE level repertoire, developing group choreography whilst analysing and reflecting on their own and others work. The company then offered 6 of our pupils a scholarship to attend their training programme in central Cardiff for the continuation of the year.

As from September 2023, we will be joining forces with Ballet Academy Cymru to deliver a 10 week 'Introduction to ballet' programme to our gifted and talented dancers from years 7 – 9. This is an exciting project, training with the fantastic ballet teacher Nicola Peros.

To finish the year, our dancers and gymnasts will be involved in the whole school production of Grease during the week commencing July 10th. Another fantastic opportunity for the pupils to demonstrate their talent and skill, work closely with the Drama and Music dept to develop into confident, ambitious and resilient young people. The pupils are enthusiastic and are learning to move out of their comfort zones by committing to 2/3 rehearsals a week to perform on stage. For some of our pupils, it will be for the very first time in a musical production.

Next year, sees the first cohort of examination Dance starting in Year 10 studying the WJEC Level 2 Performing Arts (Dance) qualification.

Athletics

Pupils from Years 7 to 11 have competed in a number of inter school athletics events this summer at Leckwith Stadium providing experience of running, jumping and throwing in a professional arena. The events have led to Reagan McCarthy (Year 8) and Autumn Nation (Year 9) pupils being crowned county champions with countless other pupils either experiencing athletics for the first time or developing their levels of performances. This year we also had Year 9 pupils competing in the hammer throw and pole vault for the time ever in the county championships.

Due to their success Autumn Nation (Hammer), Sebastian Jones (Hammer) and Reagan McCarthy (200m) have all been selected for the County squad.

Basketball

Basketball remains an important element of the extra-curricular programme with Coach Coles coordinating and variety of participation and competitive opportunities for boys and girls.

Teams from all age groups have competed in the Vale League and a variety of tournaments including the prestigious Junior NBA initiative which brings together the best young talent to experience an NBA event.

Basketball is thriving at Whitmore and due to the success, many pupils are joining local clubs such as UWICC and Vale Vipers and Henry Beaudette (Year 9) has recently been selected as an Under 15 Welsh International.

<u>Golf</u>

Following on from last year's introduction of the Golf programme, it has been another busy year in partnership with Brynhill Golf Club. Sixty new learners from Years 7 and 8 have taken up the opportunity to have lessons with forty of them set to graduate in July and gain full membership to the club.

On July 14th we have our Annual Golf Day. At this event over fifty pupils will take part in three different levels of competition. Some will play a full 18-hole tournament and others a nine-hole scramble. We also have our first ever Golf matches with fixtures against Llanishen High School and Ysgol Plasmawr arranged and an upcoming fixture, away at Britain's leading sports school Millfield, in September.

Whitmore's Golf Programme continues to go from strength to strength and Mr Manley would like to thank Mr Joel Hutton and Brynhill Golf Professional Jordan for their continued hard work.

Disabled pupils: arrangements for the admission and access plus steps to prevent disabled pupils being treated less favourably than other pupils.

With the 21st build the school complies fully to wheelchair access requirements. Pupils with specific disabilities are given an action plan and the necessary support is offered to make their educational experience equitable across all year groups. Each pupil with a specific need is given their own PEEP (Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan) which is reviewed when needed. In these plans designated staff are responsible for the safe exit in an emergency situation. Pupils with identified sight issues will also be supported through personal IDP. (Individual Development Plan) This may include the need for colour or size modified work in line with the specific need of the pupil. All teachers are fully aware of the specific needs of individuals.

Learning Support at Whitmore High School

Individuals may need some extra support to help them meet their academic and social potential. The department consists of the Additional Learning Needs Coordinator (ALNCO) and a team of experienced teaching assistants who work in different ways to help pupils to access the curriculum.

Whitmore High School has experience of meeting different needs including: general learning difficulties, dyslexia, autism spectrum condition, hearing impairment, visual impairment, speech, language and communication difficulties and behavioural, social and emotional difficulties.

Every learner is valued and it is ensured that each student can access a broad and balanced curriculum. The school endeavours to make adjustments to ensure that our school is as inclusive as possible.

The school follows an equal opportunities policy in line with the Vale of Glamorgan.

The Additional Learning Needs (ALN) Act

The ALN Act is being implemented over three years from January 2022. This will replace the Special Educational Needs (SEN) Code of Practice and terms including Statement of SEN, School Action and School Action Plus will no longer be used.

Learners with Additional Learning Needs who require Additional Learning Provision (ALP) will have an Individual Development Plan (IDP).

Additional Learning Provision refers to a higher level of support beyond the scope of the school's standard provision for all students.

Additional Learning Provision is defined by the Act as 'educational or training provision that is additional to, or different from, that generally made for others the same age.' (Section 6.11)

Learners with support needs will be recorded on the Whitmore High School Monitor Register and will be identified to staff, they may also have a support plan.
